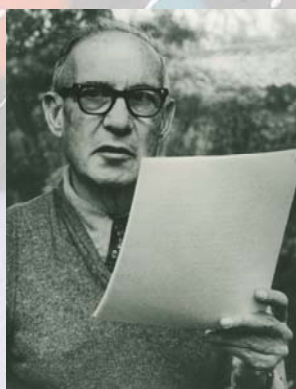

DRUCKER ARCHIVES NOW IN THE CCDL

Digital Library consists of digitized correspondence, transcripts and videos of interviews and soon photographs will be added. Visit the Drucker Archives on the CGU campus and see the original objects and then go back to your dorm room or office and study the digital objects on your computer, use the images in presentations for class, or send the reference URL in an e-mail to someone you think might be interested in the Drucker legacy.

Peter F. Drucker (1909-2005), a social ecologist, writer, consultant, and CGU professor, published 41 books on economics, politics,

society, and management that have been translated into 37 languages. Coordinated with his writings, he developed a series of professional training programs including, most recently, a series of on-line courses on management and business strategies.

Drucker's ideas continue to influence those who work, study and teach in the fields of economics, politics, society, and management, and the digital collection is one more tool to utilize examples of his writings in class projects, teaching, and research. The collection is continually growing, with new items added each week, so check the CCDL often, <http://ccdlibraries.claremont.edu>, or get RSS notification by visiting the online collection and subscribing.
