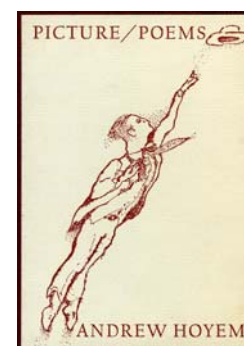
**A Childhood Reclaimed:

PUBLIC OPINION POLLS

Public opinion polls provide useful raw data about all sorts of subjects and events. One recent student used public opinion poll data to analyze ethnicity and socioeconomic status in Orange County, California concerning Proposition 227, a 1998 ballot measure about English language instruction in public schools.

The **Roper Polls** database, found on the Libraries web site under Databases—Datasets, is one easy-to-search source for data on public opinion. You can search through hundreds of thousands of questions, not just from Roper, but also Gallup, Harris, and many newspapers.
